



So far, we have introduced five pillars of the vision of education that aims at children's "independence" and "future happiness," but this time we will focus on the last one: "Hope and Peace."





Watercolorist and Illustrator

Taku Furuyama

MeySen's campus maps and picture books for the kindergarten reading lessons are made with watercolor paintings by illustrator, Taku Furuyama. We are also in the process of replacing the artwork of the Bible stories which we show our students, with new illustrations by Mr. Furuyama. The first artwork we asked Mr. Furuyama to create was our kindergarten's campus maps, some 20 years ago. Since then, Taku Furuyama's paintings, with their gentle lines and colors, have become an integral part of MeySen's education. We spoke with Mr. Furuyama, who held his 70th anniversary solo exhibition in March, about his creative activities for MevSen.

Originally, when I went to university, I intended to become a museum curator, but there were no job openings, and I found a job as an animator instead. After that, there were twists and turns, and I found myself on the road to becoming a painter. Various connections and experiences intertwined to make me the painter Lam today.

I believe that illustrating for MevSen's picture books is a meaningful job because it allows me to be indirectly involved in the children's emotional education. I draw with the hope that when they grow up, my illustrations will remain somewhere in their memories. I feel strongly that the Bible story illustrations will be "very much a part of the children's future," and I am very happy that they will be etched in the memories of the children at the school.

Painting landscapes in watercolor is another one of my jobs. My feelings and approach are completely different from when I paint for a

What is important to me when painting landscapes, is how to express the emotion I feel at the moment I encounter the landscape.

On the other hand, artwork for picture books is about how to support the text of the story. We place the highest priority on how we can best convey what we want to convey in the text to the children. We also consider the impact when the page is turned. Therefore, I use a variety of angles and compositions. In my mind, creating illustrations for picture books is similar to making a movie.

Hope & Peace

The thoughts behind this pillar are that each child should

- Know that life is precious and that you are created in the image of God
- Know that you are loved by God
- · Have the hope of forgiveness of sins and eternal life

And it is also about developing a sense of selfaffirmation that comes from the above. Have you ever thought about where you came from, why you exist, what will happen to you in the future, and what will happen to you after you die? If you don't know the meaning or purpose of life and just spend your life in limbo, you will likely have no hope or peace about the future, and you will likely develop anxiety and fear. On the other hand, knowing the correct answers to these questions will give you a sense of purpose in life, and hope and peace in your heart.

A precious life created in the image of God

Every person is a precious being. The Bible says that when God created the heavens and earth, he finally created humans in his own image. Humans, unlike other animals, were given not only bodies but also souls, and were able to commune with God. The first

humans had no trouble or worries, talked with God every day, and lived in joy. There was no sin, no death. Unique Classes at Premier Elementary

At Premier School Elementary, students learn about biology, geography, physics, chemistry, environmental issues, and much more in English at each grade level.

G1 – G6 students, we hope you enjoy this year of unique learning with your classmates, that you cannot experience anywhere else!

Examples of our unique projects

G1 (1st grade) Developmental Biology

Developmental biology is the study of the process by which an organism develops from an egg to an adult. In our G1 classes, the students place fertilized chicken eggs into an incubator and observe their growth by candling the eggs (shining a light "through" the egg, to see the growing embryo inside). Watching the growth of the embryos, and then seeing the baby chicks begin to break through their shells and emerge, gives our first graders the feeling of being a proud parent! Documenting their observations in a journal in English helps them learn new vocabulary and improve their writing skills.

G4 (4th grade) Electricity, Magnetism, and the Environment

In our G4 classes, students learn about electricity and magnetism by building circuits and making electromagnets. Students learn the principles of how machines work by supplying energy and the importance of conserving electricity to protect the earth's natural resources.

They also engage in discussions on how to protect the environment's soil, air, and water; conduct a composting experiment where they carefully observe and document the formation of nutrient-rich soil by making compost from food scraps; and create posters about solutions to waste disposal, environmental destruction, animal habitat destruction, air pollution, and more.



Premier Elementary Graduates Surpass 500

On March 16, a graduation ceremony was held for the Premier Elementary G6 students. Dressed in purple caps and gowns, the students were full of joy and pride after eight years of hard work and accomplishment, as they marched up to the stage to receive their diplomas.

Eighteen years have passed since the establishment of Premier School in 2006, and the number of graduates from Premier Elementary has just exceeded 500 in this past graduation ceremony in March 2024.

We sincerely hope that the Premier School students who have graduated from MeySen will find their own paths and continue to learn and grow, and that they will take advantage of any future encounters where they can use their English to communicate with others.

High School Celebrates 25th Anniversary

MeySen High School celebrated its 25th anniversary this past school year! When the program was established in April of 1999, it was called "ESL Class" but was later renamed to MeySen "High School." After graduating from Friends Club, our junior and senior high school students enrolled in the High

The High School program uses the National Geographic Learning publication "TIME ZONES" for the first three years of junior high school and "Interchange" from Cambridge University Press for the first two years of high school. Both materials are designed to improve conversational skills while learning relevant vocabulary and grammar based on themes that are age-appropriate and interesting for high school students.

After the homeroom teacher completes a basic explanation of the theme, students speak one-by-one with the teacher, or in pairs with other students. A significant amount of class time is devoted to giving the students opportunities to speak in English, and we push them to express their opinions and thoughts with confidence. At the same time, they will also improve their English accuracy by having their homeroom teachers point out grammar and pronunciation errors and teach them natural expressions.

The High School program also offers a three-week study trip to Europe, where participating students visit England, France, and Germany, in the fall of their second year of high school. This trip gives our high school students the opportunity to use the English they have learned, to communicate with people from around the world.

We encourage all our Friends Club graduates, who love English and want to acquire English skills that will be useful for studying abroad and entering universities in the future, to consider joining our MeySen High School program!
